

FROM THE RABBI

Dear Parents, Friends and Alumni:

The IU campus is almost silent as the students head out for the Thanksgiving recess. The vacation provides us with an opportunity to pause and reflect on our lives. It can also provide us with a time to celebrate with family and friends and to offer thanks for the many blessings in our lives.

There is discussion among some modern day rabbis as to whether or not we should embrace the celebration of Thanksgiving as a Jewish community since it isn't a Jewish holiday. Many rabbis agree that since it is a day of remembrance to citizens of this country, is secular--not religious, and remains a voluntary celebration, Jewish law (halakhah) would have no prohibition against celebrating with a meal and having turkey.

I would also suggest that Thanksgiving, as in giving thanks, is something that is intimately bound up with Jewish tradition. According to tradition, we, as Jews, give thanks one hundred times each day. We offer thanks before and after eating. Every morning in the traditional liturgy we give thanks for the gift of waking up each day, opening our eyes, having the strength to stand up, get through the day, clothe ourselves, etc. We offer thanks for the daily miracles that are inherent in everyday life. Judaism also teaches us through brachot, blessings, to offer thanks for all we do. Many of the Jewish holidays remind us to be thankful for the people around us, the miracle of life and the ability to celebrate together.

I believe that Judaism teaches us how to make our ordinary everyday lives extraordinary. Judaism teaches us to celebrate and sanctify life by making our lives holy and special. One of the important ways that we do this is by being thankful for all that we have, all that life offers and by constantly remembering to be thankful for the gift of life. Judaism offers us many commandments that remind us to look around and celebrate all humanity, to recognize the inherent worth, value and dignity of every person, to be thankful through sanctifying life, time and space.

May we use this Thanksgiving holiday as a reminder to thank God for the gift of life, to remember that those we love are present in our lives, that the world is a special place and that our lives are holy and special. I would suggest that as we sit around your

Thanksgiving table this year that each person takes the time to not only offer thanks for the blessings in their lives but also to think about what s/he will do to make the lives of others more meaningful. Can we share our gifts, talents and resources with those who are less fortunate? Can we offer our talents to others to help them to make their lives more meaningful? Have we helped others in the past year to have better lives? Let us not only appreciate what we have but also take the time to make this world a better place. I wish you and your families a very happy Thanksgiving holiday.

CENTER FOR INFORMAL JEWISH EDUCATION UPDATE FROM RABBI RON KLOTZ

What a blessing it has been for me to begin planning and programming here at Hillel. Not only do I get to work with a wonderful staff of creative and dedicated individuals, but I come into contact with IU students searching for meaning and direction in their lives. I am inspired by their spirit and enthusiasm. I am honored to help foster positive Jewish identity and understanding here in this important Jewish institution.

We have instituted several projects as part of my involvement in Jewish life on campus thus far this academic year. We began by offering several creative and special Friday night, Erev Shabbat experiences. For example, we planned and presented a URJ Camp Reunion Shabbat. Shabbat Rocks planned a camp-inspired, musical Reform Shabbat service, and students from an array of Jewish campus came to meet up with friends, and reminisce about their summers. Of course each Shabbat service is followed by a free, delicious dinner complete with Kiddush and Motzi. The Shabbat vibe here is dynamic, festive, and so communal. Reminds me of camp (and that's a high compliment).

In October I began offering "Rabbi Hours" at the Starbucks here on Indiana Ave. Rabbi Hours are similar to a professor's office hours. Once a week for two hours I sit at Starbucks ready to talk to anyone who wants to drop by and schmooze. I didn't know if anyone would join me but have been pleasantly surprised that students have come each week to informally talk about whatever is on their minds. The subjects have ranged from making Aliyah, to changing majors from pre-med to public health, to friend issues. I discussed the Jewish concepts of sin and after-life with two Jewish students and then continued with a non-Jewish student who just happened to be sitting at the next table and overheard us. One student came in to talk about rabbinical school and another to talk about cantorial school. Cool stuff, indeed. Rabbi hours will continue on Thursdays from 3:00 to 5:00pm – pass the word.

Last Friday evening, Daniel Weber, Hillel Engagement Associate and I paid visits to AEPHI and SDT to "Make Shabbat" with them. We walked into their dining rooms as they were eating dinner and asked if we could do some Shabbat blessings and share challah with them. We were completely welcomed and received with smiles. We proceeded to light candles, say Kiddush and share challah with the girls in each house. The spirit was positive and the mood was light. We all enjoyed the 15 minute Shabbat intros and were invited to "come back anytime" with a Shabbat story and mini ceremony. Next time we are thinking of bringing a song leader with us to do a song or two with the blessings.

A new partnership has been formed between IU Hillel and the 33 Jewish students presently studying at DePauw University in Greencastle, Indiana, 45 miles from Bloomington. They are working to establish a Hillel on their campus. I travel to Greencastle one Friday evening each month to meet with their three religious school aged students, speak Hebrew with one of their high school students who wants to practice speaking the language, lead Shabbat services for the DePauw students and the Jewish professors and families in the community, and have Shabbat dinner with the Jewish community. They are

a delightful group and the programs and services have been positive and spiritual.

On Monday, November 14th, a close friend from GUCI was able to volunteer his time and spend the day with the IU Jewish community. Danny Nichols, a phenomenal Jewish musician and mentor to many young songleaders, spent the day meeting with students, teaching a portion of a Jewish music course, teaching a Master Class to advanced songleaders, and leading a community-wide "Night of Music" featuring both Jewish and folk music, where participants were invited to bring their own instruments, voices, and friends. He impacted over 100 students in one day, and I have already seen the positive impact he has left on our students here in Bloomington.

I had no idea retired life could be so busy. Informal Jewish education is doing well here at Indiana University.

MOVING FROM HATE TO HARMONY: A WEEK FOCUSED ON DIVERSITY EDUCATION

This past semester, there have been several reported hate-based incidents around the IU campus and the Bloomington community. On October 6th, a student who identifies as a lesbian reported a death threat on her door and two days later, students reported swastikas drawn on the dry erase boards throughout a Briscoe Quad floor. To Hillel, these actions are unacceptable and the organization wanted to take action. And thus, Hillel created the "Moving From Hate to Harmony" week.

Throughout the week of November 7th, Hillel, in cooperation with the Union Board, Episcopal Campus Ministry, St. Paul Catholic Center, La Casa,

many Community Educators (Cues), and student volunteers organized several exhibits, speakers, and discussions to promote action against hate and how to identify and combat it. All events were open to the general public and were received a great response from the community. The first main event was on Tuesday night and was called “Holocaust Through the Eyes of Students”. It consisted of a panel presentation of college students’ experience in Eastern Europe, their personal testimonies, and a question and answer session. Another panel discussion followed this called “The Holocaust and its Relevance Today”, featuring Professor Alvin Rosenfeld (distinguished Holocaust scholar), Mother Linda (of Episcopal Campus Ministries), and Conrad Weiner (child survivor of the Holocaust).

Conrad Weiner, a child Holocaust survivor and IU alumnus spent three days in Bloomington taking part in programming, spending time with students, and educating the Bloomington community. Because there are very few Holocaust survivors left, Mr. Weiner’s presence was extremely significant throughout the week. He spoke about his experiences in Romanian concentration camps, shared stories of his family, and taught the audience invaluable life lessons. Fittingly, his presentation coincided with the anniversary of Kristallnacht, which added more emotion and meaning to his Wednesday night speaking engagement. On Wednesday evening, Rabbi Sue and a committee of students and lay leaders led the “Putting This into Action” program. The theme was how to respond in the face of intolerance. The program featured musical presentations from multiple musical groups from many cultural and religious centers including Hillel’s A capella group, Hooshir, and was followed by an action-based workshop.

During the entire week of activities, a photo gallery was present in the Dunn Meadow Café, which depicted both hate and tolerance. Informal conversations took place with students, Conrad Weiner, and Bloomington United.

Hillel is very appreciative of the time that Mr. Weiner and all of the steering committee members, and program participants generously gave to make “Moving from Hate to Harmony” a successful week. The week was about learning from our past and planning for our future. Through Holocaust survivors, student testimonials and pictures, and panel discussions, the program aimed to teach students and Bloomington citizens how to recognize and respond to hate in the community. The themed week reached over 500 students and community members. “It goes back to that phrase, ‘Nothing’s going to change unless you change it,’ and students need to realize if it’s going to change, it starts with them,” said Hillel Program Director Ilana Nadel.

Every year a dedicated group of Jewish students from IU and an IU Hillel staff member spends their spring break volunteering in different cities around the world. In the past students have gone to New Orleans, Miami, Nicaragua, California, and Israel. Last year, under the leadership of Molly Rosenfeld and Jenna Siegel, Yad in Hand (Hand in Hand), the official IU Hillel Alternative Spring Break Student Organization Group was formed. As an official student group, Yad in Hand has access to IU resources including marketing and funding opportunities. Molly and Jenna are once again co-chairing this year's Yad in Hand Alternative Spring Break group, and are spearheading two groups traveling this March, one to New Orleans and one to Israel.

The group traveling to New Orleans is a student designed trip consisting of three track options. Participants have the choice to spend their week building homes for Katrina victims, working with students in the RENEW school system, or volunteering in different religious and cultural centers. All three tracks will come together each

evening for reflection sessions, consisting of a lesson in the history of Jazz music, a meet & greet with IU alumni who are teaching in New Orleans, and a ghost tour of the French Quarter. The group will also have the opportunity to create their own Shabbat experience and have free time to explore the city.

The students traveling to Israel will travel with Jewish National Fund (JNF) to Southern Israel. Participants will have opportunities to work hands on with the farmers of the Negev and learn about cultivating and developing the land to make it sustainable. They will also have the opportunity to learn about the many JNF projects in Israel, including the underground playground for families in S'derot. Students participating in either of these trips have the opportunity to sign up for P180, participate in class sessions before and after the travel experiences, and receive 1 credit hour for their service. The students that participate in these trips are incredibly dedicated and giving. They will spend time learning about the people and communities they will impact as well as gathering donations and supplies to take with them. Students will return to IU with new friendships and strong bonds from a week of intense service.
